REPORT OF THE HONORARY GENERAL SECRETARY

1. Introduction

1973 was an eventful year for the Guild. In May the Central Council paid its first visit to our diocese since 1893, and many members took the opportunity to meet representatives from all over the country. The joint committee appointed by the Guild and the Oxford Society worked very hard in raising funds to cover the cost of being hosts and dealing with the many problems associated with the visit. They are to be congratulated on the excellent results of their many hours of work and for bearing the financial burden imposed by committee membership—many of them travelled over a thousand miles to attend the committee meetings. A commemorative book is being prepared and this will be on view at the Annual General Meeting at Kingham on 6 July 1974.

The retirement of Canon Elliot Wigg, after forty years in office, first as deputy master and afterwards as master, took place at the Banbury meeting. In his own way he has enriched the Guild as did his predecessors in office—for him the Oxford Diocesan Guild has always come first. His constancy and devotion to duty should be an inspiration to us all. The members at Banbury paid him the highest honour they could bestow by making him a vice-president of the Guild. We wish him and Mrs. Wigg every happiness in the future in their new life in Cornwall.

2. Membership

During the year 279 new members were elected to the guild, thirty of them being non-resident life members. The total membership now stands as follows:

These figures differ slightly from those quoted in last year's report as a more accurate record of one branch has now been received.

Amongst the losses by death we have to record that of Rt. Rev. R. M. Hay, one of our Vice-Presidents, who was Bishop of Buckingham from 1944 to 1960. Henry Mulford of Wantage joined the Guild in 1907, after learning to ring at Harwell; his immaculate striking on the back end is still remembered at Wantage. He was one of the last remaining links with the past in that he could recall the famous 'no peal, no pudding' comment by Rev. F. E. Robinson. When the bells at Wantage were rehung in 1938 Henry and his wife played a major part in the raising of the funds.

Leslie Haines became a member in 1920 and for thirty-one years was tower captain at Goring. He was a good servant of his church and will be missed for the odd joinery jobs he did there, as well as for his regularity and punctuality at ringing. Appleton tower will be the poorer for the loss of two of its most respected ringers. Henry White lived all his life in the village, learning to ring as a boy and continuing until ill health forced him to retire in his early eighties. Ted Drewitt moved to the village just after the war and, even after returning to Oxford to live, continued to be a faithful member of Appleton band.

Aubrey Lloyd of Charlbury was a good churchman and a keen chorister, as well as a competent and willing ringer, always ready to help struggling bands. He will be missed in the Festival choir. Another first-rate churchman and churchwarden was Jim Eustace

of Piddington, elected a member in 1933.

Mrs. Mary Dixon learned to ring at Abingdon in 1960 when her husband, Canon Dixon, became vicar. She had boundless energy and proved an invaluable asset to the band. In 1969 Canon Dixon became rector of Aston Rowant and she brought her untiring enthusiasm to bear in raising interest in the bells, silent for many years. The rapidly growing bell fund that she initiated and the learners she interested will continue her fine work.

May they all rest in peace.

3. Meetings

The general committee met twice in 1973. The first occasion was in March when forty members met at Tilehurst; those present will long remember the moving tribute paid to Canon Wigg as retiring master by the Guild treasurer, Arthur Barker. The meeting then proceeded with reports of the sub-committees on rule amendments, education and training, and the Central Council visit. A grant of £50 to Caversham, recommended by a majority of the restoration committee, met with some discussion but was finally ratified by a large majority. The subscription for honorary members, which was raised to 50p in 1972, was reduced to 35p, the same as for ringing members.

The second general committee meeting was held in September at Woodburn. Only twenty-eight members attended and these, after lengthy debate, proceeded to reverse all the decision made on rule amendments over the past three committee meetings. It was further decided to recommend that no alterations to the rules—except those that prevent the proper functioning of the Guild—be made for a three year period. A great deal of time has been taken up in recent years, discussing rules and rule amendments; it seems a pity that all this time has now been wasted. A grant of £50 was given from the restoration fund to West Wycombe and

the grant to Caversham was raised by a further £25 due to their 50% increase in expenditure. The Guild will be one hundred years old in only another seven years time and a Centenary Celebration Fund has been set up to cover the increase in expenditure that will result.

The Banbury branch was the host for the A.G.M. this year and members from all over the Guild converged on Banbury itself on a hot summer's day for Canon Wigg's last meeting as master. The members showed their appreciation of his services to the Guild as deputy master from 1933 and master from 1946 by electing him a vice-president of the Guild and then presenting him with a cheque for £215.85, subscribed by friends and ringing bands from all over the diocese. A Bouquet was presented to Mrs. Wigg at the same time. Mr. Frederick Sharpe was elected master and Mr. Timothy G. Pett deputy master. All the other officers were reelected for another year. The Ringing World was given a donation of £10.50 from the general fund, although a proposal to transfer £25 per annum to the reserve fund was lost as it was felt that sufficient funds were not available.

The tea arranged by members of the branch was lavish and enjoyed by all those who stayed. It was a great pity that more members did not attend the Guild service at St. Mary's, Banbury, for the Rev. D. Bishop, rector of Bodicote, gave a lively and inter-

esting address.

The Guild Striking Contest was held in May and as usual clashed with that other sporting event, the Cup Final. The East Berks. and South Bucks. branch had arranged the contest at Dorney and due to the forethought of one team member, those not ringing were able to watch the match on a portable T.V. set. The standard of ringing was again very high, Wantage taking first place, St. Mary's, Reading, the second, and Easthampstead the third. We thank the judges, David Parsons of the Guildford Diocesan Guild and Charles Kippen of the Winchester and Portsmouth Diocesan Guild, who had travelled a considerable distance to take part. Mr. E. E. Gosling of Boyne Hill again produced some excellent certificates and these were presented, with the cup, to the teams at the A.G.M.

The Annual Festival followed the traditional pattern and a large congregation heard the Guild librarian, Rev. E. B. Wood, give the address in the Cathedral. It was a sad occasion for the master for his wife, Mrs. Janie Sharpe, had died the previous day. Tribute must be paid to the master for his fortitude, for very few of those at the luncheon were aware of his great loss. Some excellent after-dinner speeches were made at the luncheon by Peter Davies, Ven. W. R. Birt (Archdeacon of Berkshire), Arthur Barker, and Miss E. M. Bliss (Chairman of the Gloucester and Bristol Association). The usual ringing took place in the City afterwards, some members going on the country tour organized by Philip Walker to the Chiltern branch.

4. Branch Review

The reports from each branch show that the usual round of practices and meetings have continued this year. The Banbury branch considered changing its name to the North Oxfordshire branch, but eventually decided to retain the old name. The North Berks. branch will be mainly in Oxfordshire from April 1974, following the new local government areas. The members balloted for a new name for the branch and by a substantial majority, de-

cided that it should be the 'Old North Berks.' branch.

Six branch secretaries retired during 1973. Mr. Claude Corderov decided that after ten years in office, he should make way for a new man and Mr. L. F. Cox has taken over as Secretary of the Old North Berks. branch. Mr. M. J. Harrison was secretary of the Oxford City and District branch for three years; due to pressure of other commitments, he has given up and his place has been taken by Miss E. M. Barber. Mr. I. M. M. O'Reilly did a splendid job as secretary of the South Oxon, branch and the members there were very sad to lose him on his move to Witney. Mr. R. J. Aspley is the new secretary. In the Sonning Deanery branch Mr. D. Willis was in office for two years; his place has been taken by Mr. S. G. Scott. The Newbury branch again changed its secretary -Mr. R. B. Pike succeeding Mr. C. Lewington. Finally, in the Witney and Woodstock branch, Mr. J. N. O'Beirne has replaced Miss L. Freke in office. We thank all those retiring officers for the work they have done for the Guild, and wish their successors a happy and enjoyable term of office.

5. Publicity

As a Guild we are fortunate that our master is one of the country's leading authorities on bells. As such, Mr. Sharpe is asked to broadcast regularly and during the first half of 1973 he gave a series of thirty-two weekly talks on churches and their bells in the Oxford diocese. In over half of these talks on Radio Oxford the bells were rung. Towards the end of the year he gave another talk on bells, dealing principally with those of Westminster Abbey and Great Somerford. Christmas Eve provided another opportunity and Mr. Sharpe arranged and announced a half-hour programme on bells that included handbell ringing. Prior to the Central Council visit, he gave a talk about the activities of the Council and the Guild, which was followed up after the meeting with broadcast interviews of personalities present.

The Launton Handbell Ringers gave four recitals on Radio Oxford at the beginning of the year and in December, their handbell recordings were used to introduce programmes on ten occasions. They were also featured live on B.B.C. television. The programme 'Town and Around' had featured the master in a ten minute programme on his bells and founders' marks, his books,

and Launton church with its unusual belfry entrance, together with

many other aspects of his work on ringing.

The Ringing World carried many stories from the Guild. A special issue was made for the Central Council visit and an aerial photo of Oxford was used on the cover. Another Guild tower featured on the cover during the year was North Hinksey. Excerpts from the branch newsletters were published and one of these dealing with the presentation of ringers with their membership certificates at the morning service at Drayton brought forward some favourable comments. The centenary of the Oxford University Society was commemorated by the augmentation of St. Mary Magdalen, Oxford, to eight, and the report of this received good coverage in the Ringing World. The A.G.M., Striking Contest, and Festival were all reported as were many branch meetings.

An attempt was made to increase interest in the Guild by sending items to the Oxford Diocesan Magazine. Three appeared but pressure of space led to the others being left out. It is a pity that a large body of people like our members, who are interested in the church, cannot be catered for on a more regular basis in our

diocesan magazine.

Branch newsletters continue to flourish. The North Bucks. branch issued their first in July and the Vale of the White Horse branch included a news sheet to their towers in September. The Banbury, South Oxon., North Berks., and Newbury branches continue to foster interest among their members with their quarterly newsletters. A Guild news bulletin was issued half-way through the year and at the branch secretaries' meeting in November it was decided to try to augment this with material from the branches.

6. Education and Training

During the year an attempt was made by the education and training sub-committee to arrange courses catering for various ringing standards. Three eight week courses of one evening per week were organized in conjunction with the W.E.A. at Newbury, Abingdon, and Reading. Nearly 100 ringers and non-ringers attended these lectures which aimed at widening the students' appreciation of all spheres of ringing activity. A weekend residential course was organized at Easthampstead Adult Education Centre; branches were invited to sponsor candidates for this potential leaders' course. The weekend was thoroughly enjoyed by lecturers and students alike and it is proposed to make it an annual event. The benefits of the course are already being realised—two of the students have been elected branch secretaries.

One day courses have proved quite popular with some branches. These are arranged in the following way: A small number of ringers all at the same stage are gathered together with the common object of attaining the next rung on the ladder. After the

theory has been explained they all have an opportunity to practise with a competent band. Further theory lessons can be arranged if required. With this type of tuition it is possible to reach a degree of proficiency not obtainable at normal branch practices. The sub-committee hopes that more branches will take advantage of the scheme.

7. Peals

The following members rang their first peal this year: Susan G. Hanlon, Denis Woodley, Berice Large, William H. Davis, Jane P. White, Anka J. Rowe, Sheila Glenny, Christopher Philbrick, Josie S. Irving, and Roy D. Ballard. We wish them well in their peal

ringing careers.

There were fewer peals of note this year. Several new methods were rung for the first time, including a peal of Launcells Surprise Major at Hook Norton as a farewell to Canon and Mrs. Wigg. The first peal on the augmented bells at Bierton was rung, whilst one at High Wycombe commemorated the 222nd anniversary of the first in the tower. Long Crendon recorded the first on their bells since rehanging, and one at Brize Norton was claimed to be the first since 1936. An outstanding performance was the peal in 100 Caters methods at Warfield. This was the first time that more than five methods had been rung to a peal of caters. Lastly a sponsored peal of Grandsire Doubles at Aston Tirrold in aid of the bell repair fund was the first by all except the conductor. The band are to be congratulated for their efforts.

8. Quarter Peals

It has not proved possible to keep a complete record of all the quarter peals rung this year. However the reports in the *Ringing World* show that an impressive number of first quarter peals and first in the method have been rung. There have been a number of quarter peal outings; the Central Bucks. branch members have shown considerable enterprise in this—on one occasion ringing five in an afternoon in different towers.

There have been quarter peals rung for many other reasons than pleasure or practice. Many have been rung in memoriam following the death of local ringers. It often proves impossible to trace these in Guild records so they are not included in the obituary list

One quarter at Dinton was the first on the bells, whilst another at Caversham was the first on the newly dedicated bells. Ringing at Ambrosden congratulated one of the band on the birth of quads, which brought excited 'phone calls from the editor of the *Ringing World* to the general secretary. It was the farmer's ewe that had made local radio and television news, however, by having four lambs—an unusual event!

9. Miscellaneous

In January the Guild's globe-trotting octogenarian, Mr. L. Stilwell, set off for South Africa accompanied by one of the Guild trustees, Mr. A. R. Pink. They had an enjoyable three months' holiday, ringing at Cape Town, Que Que, Salisbury, and the two towers at Durban. An interesting account of their wanderings appeared in the *Ringing World*. Just before Christmas Mr. Pink had a severe heart attack but, happily, at the time of writing, he has fully recovered.

Mr. É. G. Swift of Chalfont St. Peter was in the news with a presentation from the local ringers and the P.C.C. to mark his seventieth birthday and the fifty-eighth anniversary of his taking up ringing. Among the marriages during the year we should mention those of Mr. and Mrs. Ian O'Reilly and Mr. and Mrs. John Napper. The former are well known in the South Oxon. area and the latter are popular in the North Berks. and Newbury

branches.

We are very grateful to Mr. E. J. Peett for having two sets of reports bound and presented to the Guild for the use of the Hon-

orary General Secretary and the Report Editor.

During 1973 the master attended sixteen meetings and represented the Guild at four funerals. He carried out inspections in twenty-nine towers, twelve in Berks., ten in Bucks., and three in Oxon. He gave advice on rehanging in thirteen, tower repairs in fifteen, sound control in twelve, maintenance in eleven, augmentation in four, and recasting in four. He lectured at all the ringing courses organized by the education sub-committee. He would like to express his thanks to all those who sent flowers when his wife died and to the other Guild officers for their staunch support on the day of the Guild Festival.

The deputy master reports as follows: 'At the start of my term of office, I expressed the intention of visiting every branch of the Guild in order to meet as many members as possible, hear their points of view, and to find out what was going on in different parts of the Guild. By the end of 1973 I had managed to visit seven of them, six of these occasions being branch meetings and one a

branch practice.

With possibly one exception, I have been impressed by the enthusiasm for ringing and, in particular, the desire for instruction which seems to prevail throughout most of the diocese. The preponderance of young people attending branch functions is also an encouraging sign for the future, not only for this Guild but the exercise as a whole.

In addressing the meetings which I have attempted to give some indication of the important issues which are currently being discussed at Guild level such as education and

training and the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund.

I have been able to assist in a small way with the educational aspects of ringing by lecturing at the Guild's highly successful week-end course at Easthampstead Park and the W.E.A. sponsored evening courses at Reading and Abingdon. I hope to be able to continue with these activities in 1974 and to visit the rest of the branches.'

The Guild librarian, Rev. E. B. Wood, has announced that, having held the office for ten years, he wishes to retire at the next A.G.M. We shall have to find a new home for the library, which occupies approximately thirty feet of shelving. Additions to the books this year are: Diagrams in the Jasper Snowdon series, new edition, and the annual reports of seventeen guilds and associa-

tions, mostly for 1970.

The four Guild stewards have been active in various ways. Mr. D. G. Wheeler attended twenty-four meetings and practices in the Buckinghamshire branches and Mr. D. A. Cornwall was busy in South Bucks, and the eastern end of Berkshire. Mr. B. J. Davis continued with his joint job of Guild steward and secretary of the Banbury branch and Mr. P. G. Davies, who was elected at the last A.G.M., replacing Mr. T. G. Pett, has attended meetings in

three of the four branches for which he is responsible.

Once again I have visited most parts of the diocese during the year. I did not attend as many branch meetings as last year as the general officers have organized an informal rota system to save expense. I spent a great deal of time attending most sessions of each of the courses run by the education sub-committee, and was very pleased with the results. Please see if there is a demand for similar courses in your area. Typing and duplicating involve many hours of a secretary's time and I am very grateful to Miss D. J. Pollard for undertaking so much of the typing. Finally I should like to thank all the other Guild and branch officers for their work throughout the year.

HONORARY GENERAL TREASURER'S REPORT

The General Funds of the Guild amount to £2,437.81, of which £2.046.94 is in the Restoration Fund.

Some branches have again failed to bring their contributions to the General Fund up-to-date and with some expenses arriving too late to be included in the current accounts, a true picture of the financial state of the Guild cannot be shown.

Also, despite the fact that some Parochial Church Councils increased their contributions to the Restoration Fund, the number contributing has fallen from fifty-one to forty-two, and the income

from this source is down £20.

However, there is an increase of £240 in the total General Funds, partly from the increase in subscriptions, a saving on the cost of the Report, and £76 of this being in the Restoration Fund mainly

due to donations and interest on investments.

During the year £56.95 was contributed by the following forty-two Parochial Church Councils: Appleton, Aston Clinton, Aston Rowant, Aston Tirrold (2), Benson, Blewbury, Bucklebury, Cassington, Cookham, Cropredy, Cumnor, Drayton St. Leonard, Drayton (St. Peter), East Hagbourne, East Hendred, Eynsham, Hardwicke, Harwell (5), Henley-on-Thames, Hinton Waldrist, Hitcham, Hurst (2), Launton (2), Long Crendon, Marcham, Marlow, Newbury (2), North Hinksey, Radley, Slough, Steventon (2), Stoke Poges, Stratford Mortimer (S.M.V. and St. John), Thame, Thatcham, Towersey, Twyford (Berks.), Tyringham, Wantage (2), Wendover, Wolvercote, and Yarnton.

The following arrived too late to be included in the total:

Wooburn and Oxford (St. Giles).

Some Parochial Church Councils have brought their contributions up-to-date, and grateful thanks are accorded to those who have increased their subscriptions. Nine however have fallen behind.

Donations were received from Major R. L. Ioyd, O.B.E., M.C., Rt. Rev. D. G. Loveday, the ringers at Letcombe Regis, Nether Winchenden, and Wallingford, the Secretary's meeting, and the Central Bucks., Newbury, and South Oxon branches.

The collection at Banbury amounted to £10.70, and at Oxford

to £14.86.

Grants were paid to Chalfont St. Giles, Long Crendon, North

Hinksey, and Twyford, Berks.

Branch Secretaries are again reminded that all Reports must be paid for, and that their quota of subscriptions should be sent to the Hon. General Treasurer by 1 December.

This is obviously a long term venture, and it may be two or three years before my successor is able to report any progress. The secretary suggested that the monthly branch practices held in different towers achieve little. They were supported by about six regulars, and perhaps a small number from the home tower. The practice achieved little for the tower, since it was visited about once every two years. He suggested that a monthly practice, held regularly at the same tower, with a view to teaching change ringing was likely to attract more support. The idea was accepted, with monthly practices now being held on the third Saturday of each month at Northleigh, the intention is to provide basic instruction in change ringing. In general this idea has proved reasonably popular. A branch outing was organized, but sufficient support did not materialise and it had to be abandoned. The branch striking competition also did not take place because of lack of support although arrangements are in hand for a competition to be held in 1974.
